Dear Potential Juror,

On behalf the United States District Court for the District of Minnesota, I have the honor of informing you that you have been chosen to serve as a potential juror in a jury trial for federal court in the State of Minnesota. Jury service is a civic duty that provides a unique opportunity to participate in the judicial process and see your federal courts in action. I welcome you and hope that you will find the experience interesting and rewarding.

This is your Notice to Report for jury service.

You are to report for service to the Edward J. Devitt - U.S. District Courthouse in Fergus. Please note that the U.S. District Court, District of Minnesota is a federal court - it is not connected with Minnesota state courts located in Otter Tail, or other Minnesota counties.

Please read the enclosed Jury Service Information form in its entirety. It should answer most of your questions concerning jury service with the U.S. District Court, District of Minnesota. If you have any questions, you may call your Jury Clerk whose contact information is provided on the attached Jury Service Information form.

We are excited to offer the eJuror program which allows you to perform many jury functions online, including filling out your jury paperwork, requesting an excuse or postponement, checking the status of your jury service, and printing out an attendance certificate for your employer. A link to eJuror can be found at our website: www.mnd.uscourts.gov. Please consider using the eJuror program.

On behalf of the U.S. District Court, District of Minnesota, I thank you in advance for the time you may spend and the hard work and diligence you will give in your jury service.

Jury Service Information

Please read the following information completely and carefully. We encourage you to keep this correspondence for future reference.

Now that I received a summons for jury service, what do I have to do?

In response to the summons for jury service you received, you must complete the Jury Information Form. You may complete the paper form located at the bottom of the enclosed summons, or you may log onto our website (www.mnd.uscourts.gov) to complete the form on-line using eJuror.

What should I do on my reporting day?

Report to the Jury Assembly Room, Room 215, in the Edward J. Devitt - U.S. District Courthouse in Fergus Falls. It is crucial that you report on time; please allow yourself plenty of time to find parking and the courthouse.

****IMPORTANT:** Please call the jury information line number listed below after 5:00 p.m. the night before you are scheduled to report for jury duty. If you are reporting on a Monday, call the jury information line over the weekend. You may be informed of new reporting instructions (change of date and/or time) when you call. You may have to adjust your schedule/travel plans. If you fail to call the jury information line and you appear after a trial has been canceled, the court will not be able to reimburse you for your expenses.

- Bring photo identification with you when you report.

What attire is appropriate?

Please dress appropriately for court. Shorts, hats, halter or tank tops and jeans with tears are not acceptable courtroom attire. The courtrooms can be quite cool, so dress accordingly.

What happens when I report for jury service?

During jury selection, the judge will ask you a series of questions to determine if you are appropriate to serve on that particular jury. If you are not selected to be on the jury, you will be permitted to leave after the selection process is finished. If you are chosen to be a juror, you will then receive instructions for how to report for jury service for that trial - trial hours are set by the Judge. On most occasions, the trial will begin as soon as the jury has been selected.

What if I cannot serve as a juror or cannot serve as a juror on my reporting date?

You may request to be excused from jury service or you may request to have your jury service postponed. This request must be submitted *before* you receive a Notice to Report. Requests for excuse or postponement are handled on a case by case basis.

The Jury Clerk may excuse upon request the following occupational classes or groups of people from jury service:

- Persons over 70 years of age.
- Persons who served as a Grand or Petit Juror in the last two (2) years.
- Persons having active care of a child or children under 10 years of age whose health and/or safety would be jeopardized by the jury service, or a person who is essential to the care of aged or infirm person(s).
- Persons who serve without compensation as a volunteer firefighter or member of a rescue squad or ambulance crew for a federal, state, or local government agency.

IMPORTANT: If you feel you need to be excused for a reason other than those listed above, you will need to report for service on your reporting date and ask the judge to be excused during the jury selection.

Upon request, the Jury Clerk may grant postponement of jury service for the following:

- Persons with a health problem. You may be asked to submit a letter from your doctor to support this request.
- Persons who are enrolled as a full-time student.
- Persons with other extenuating circumstances

How do I submit a request to be excused or to postpone my jury service?

To request to be excused from jury service or to have your jury service postponed, please follow these procedures:

- Fill out the Jury Information Form, either on-line using eJuror or in paper form.
- Use the Excuse/Postpone/Partial Excuse option to submit your request on-line using eJuror or write a letter stating specifically why you need to be excused/postponed. If you are asking to postpone your service, please include the date that you will be available for such service. If you are requesting to be excused/postponed for medical reasons, you may be asked to submit a letter from your doctor.
- If your request is approved, you will receive either a letter in the mail or an email notifying you of the approval .

IMPORTANT: Requests for excusal/postponement may only be submitted by the person summonsed (not your employer). Requests for excusal/postponement must be submitted before you receive a Notice to Report. The Jury Clerk cannot grant you an excusal or postponement once you have been issued a Notice to Report.

What if my employer will not let me serve as a juror?

While you serve as a juror, your employment is protected under federal law, 28 U.S.C. § 1875. If you have questions or problems regarding your employment as a result of your being summonsed to jury service, please notify the Jury Clerk. Most employers have a jury duty policy and we encourage you to check with your employer regarding its jury duty policy.

What happens if I fail to report for jury service?

We try our very best to work with all prospective jurors so that they can timely report to jury service. In order for this to happen, we ask that you keep the Jury Clerk informed of any changes in your availability.

A juror who fails to report for jury service and who was not excused from jury service by the Court may be ordered to appear before the Court and show cause for why he or she failed to comply with the summons for jury service. Failure to appear before the Court or failure to show good cause for failing to report for jury service may result in a \$1000 fine, up to three days imprisonment, order to perform community service, or any combination thereof. 28 U.S.C. §§ 1864(b), 1866(g).

Will I be paid for jury duty?

All jurors receive \$40.00 per day, and \$0.54 per mile traveled to and from the courthouse. The court will calculate your mileage using your address on file with the court. If you live 60 miles or more from the courthouse, you may choose to stay overnight during your jury service and/or the night before selection. If you choose to stay at a hotel, you will be reimbursed the actual cost of your lodging (**not to exceed the current government rate of \$91 per night**) to cover the cost of lodging and a flat per diem rate of \$51 to cover meals and incidental expenses. If you choose to stay with a friend or relative, rather than a hotel, you will receive a flat per diem rate of \$51 to cover the costs of meals and incidental expenses.

Important Notice to Jurors Regarding Use of Technology to Conduct Research

You must not at any time perform any independent research about the case for which you may serve as a juror. This means that you must not research the internet, websites, or blogs, or use any electronic device to obtain information about any cases that are proceeding to trial during the time of your jury summons. Please refrain, before and during your jury service, from conducting any research or seeking out any information about cases for which you have been summonsed to serve as a juror.
