United States Magistrate Judge Tony N. Leung's current term of office is set to expire on April 28, 2019. As required by law, the United States District Court, District of Minnesota will establish a Merit Selection Panel of citizens to consider the reappointment of Magistrate Judge Tony N. Leung to a new eight-year term. The Court will publicly announce the Merit Selection Panel members at a later date.

The duties of the position include presiding over initial proceedings in criminal cases; trials of misdemeanor cases, including petty offenses; pretrial matters and other proceedings in civil and criminal cases; conducting civil settlement conferences; and disposition of civil cases with the consent of the parties. The basic authority of a United States Magistrate Judge is specified in 28 U.S.C. § 636 and Local Rule 72.1. Magistrate Judges are appointed by the United States District Court for eight-year terms and may be reappointed to successive terms.
