This latter motion then necessitates filing additional documents under temporary seal, and it would seem there is no end in sight as to when this whole process stops.

In addition, I find this procedure super time-consuming compared to the old system and it is also costing litigants a lot more money now due to this process which seems totally unfair to clients.

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
